

Restaurateurs, Chefs Work with Gather to Tackle Food Waste

PORTSMOUTH -

Gather, a nonprofit that has developed innovative programs to address food insecurity, has announced an initiative to utilize excess food from the hospitality industry—"Seacoast Waste Not" (SWN). The coalition is comprised of chefs and food industry leaders who are committed to reducing food waste by donating their surplus ingredients to Gather.

Gather has created a system of picking up the food from participating caterers, restaurants, and clubs, and preparing healthy meals that will be available to those in need at Gather's food

pantry in Portsmouth. SWN addresses hunger while also diverting excess food from landfills.

"It's estimated that in the

U.S., almost 40% of food produced goes to waste and 10% of our households don't have enough healthy food to eat. In

many cases, food tossed into landfills is wholesome and fresh, so this initiative is a win-win. We are excited and grateful to the hospitality community for their commitment to Seacoast Waste Not," said Gather's Culinary Director Tania Marino, who is spearheading the program.

Acclaimed restaurateur Evan Mallet said Black Trumpet has been composting for 17 years but it's not enough. "Our seacoast community is going to set an example for others to follow. We, as chefs, are often working with really good-quality ingredients and we discard more than we should, so this is an opportu-

nity to get the food out there into the Gather community."

They accept a wide array of donations, including perishable and nonperishable foods, fresh or frozen items, single ingredients, or fully-prepared offerings. Fold'd Community Diner's Executive Chef Mark Segal said, "The scale of this is going to make it enticing for restaurants to participate. I don't know anyone who enjoys throwing away good food, and chefs often feel like they don't have large enough quantities to participate in a meaningful way. With this

Karen Kulberg, founder and chair of the organization "Room for Love," knows how transformative a room makeover can be. When she turned 13, her mom redesigned her room while she was at school, changing it from a child's space to that of a young woman. Kulberg never forgot how that made her feel. "I felt seen," she said. "I was lucky to have a mom who understood that I was changing and growing up. Having a space that reflected

the real me gave me confidence, and helped me during those challenging teen years ahead."

Room for Love, based in Hampton, gives the gift of a bedroom makeover to children in need. Their services are donated to children ages 3-13 who live within 30 miles of Portsmouth, which includes southern Maine – but they hope to expand. The charity works with various social service agencies such as Big Brother Big Sister, Cross Roads House, Seacoast Family Promise, New Generation, and Step-

Up Parents, to get the names of children who would benefit from the makeover, as well as the child's needs, ages, and interests.

"Redoing a room is about much more than changing paint colors and putting on new bed-spreads," said Kulberg. "It's about making a child feel special. It shows that someone sees them and cares about them as an individual. For the rest of their lives, they'll remember that time when a dream came true."

"Ona Judge Day" Tour Kicks Off the 2024 Season

Portsmouth Black History tours have been going on for 30 years, but the Black Heritage Trail of New Hampshire (BHTNH) expanded these tours state-wide seven years ago. Known for sharing a truer, more inclusive history of New Hampshire, BHTNH's 2024 tour season kicks off with a special "Ona Judge Day" tour on Tuesday, May 21 at 222 Court St., Portsmouth.

After this event, the guided tours will be held on Saturdays and Sundays at 2 p.m. from May 25 through November 3. Two other new "Living History Tours" will feature Prince Whipple and the 1779 Petition for Freedom, and Jack Staines, the "blackjack" seafarer who married Ona Judge. A Dover Tour has also been added to the lineur

"We're thrilled to be expanding our popular warmweather tours this year," said JerriAnne Boggis, BHTNH executive director. "We're starting off strong with our special 'Ona

Judge Day' tour as part of New Hampshire's celebration of the day in 1796 on which Ona Maria Judge Staines left the residence of George and Martha Washington in Philadelphia and boarded a ship to Portsmouth, where she lived the remainder of her life in New Hampshire as a free woman."

The 2024 series includes 17 different tours with topics including New Hampshire's involvement in slave trade, the early Black community and economy, Black soldiers in the Revolutionary War, and Harriet Wilson, the first African American novelist who published in 1859. Beyond Portsmouth, guided walking tours will take place in Exeter, Milford, Dover, Hancock, Warner, and Kittery in Maine. They are led by expert guides who are trained in BHTNH's Sankofa approach literally "reaching back to get it." Sankofa Scholars are well versed on the history and culture of African Americans, and pursue a deeper understanding of racism grounded in historical research.

Boggis said, "Our themed, guided tours explore our rich and often forgotten African-American history. This nuanced and shared history continues to shape our collective present and future. Our tours offer visitors an opportunity to visualize and share a truer more inclusive history of New Hampshire. Learn this history, connect to ancestors and ancestral roots, or simply explore and see for yourself the intricately woven cultural cloth that is New Hampshire."

The Pre-Dead Social Club Hosts Two May Events

The Pre-Dead Social Club will host two events in May: "Death Over Drinks: A Diea-logue" on Monday, May 13, 5:30-7 p.m. at Stroll Cafe, 75 Portsmouth Blvd., Portsmouth; and "We Wish We Knew That! Insights and Ideas for Saying What Matters When it Matters Most," on Monday, May 20, 6-8p.m. at 3S Artspace, 319 Vaughan St., Portsmouth.

The mission of the Pre-Dead Social Club, which recently celebrated its one-year anniversary, is to cultivate multi-generational communities interested in having compassionate conversations about death, dying, and end-oflife, making it a bit easier and more tenderhearted long before a life-limiting or terminal diagnosis arises.

"Death Over Drinks: A Die-a-logue" is a facilitated event that occurs monthly and offers a

chance to explore topics related to death, dying, and our eventual end-of-life. Participants discuss, and share stories and various points of view, in response to an ice-breaker question in order to gain a wider view of one topic at a time. While the events are free and open to all, space is limited to 30 people so that pre-registration is required.

'We Wish We Knew That!"

is a thought-provoking roundtable discussion between healthcare professionals and caregivers about the roles each play in whole-person care. Individuals and their families find it increasingly challenging to navigate a fractured medical care delivery system that includes a myriad of specialists with incomplete records and splintered communication. During this event, reallife stories and personal insights revealed by attendees will illuminate the things they wish they



had known during healthcare conversations. They will also encourage an active role in one's own care and strategies for clear discussions about what is important. Tickets are \$10 per person and advanced purchase is recommended.

The makeovers also provide the children a space to persue their interests. "With the redesign, they have a place to pursue their dreams, to paint or draw, play music, read, use a computer, or just think about their future," explained Kulberg. "This is their personal space and having somewhere to call their own is empowering."

A network of interior designers, builders, craftsmen, artisans, and furniture and home goods suppliers, support Room for Love by donating their time and products. Specialists like muralists have also donated fabulous creations, including lifelike paintings of sports heroes.

Other companies and individuals help by underwriting renovation costs.

The benefits of the makeovers go far beyond the physical. Kulberg noted that the children's families report improvements in schoolwork, confidence, and initiative, as a result of the room transformations. "A personal spaces gives them wings," she said. "They can see other dreams coming true. They can envision a future."

Spectrum Connection Moves to Somersworth

Community Partners' Spectrum Connection program provides intensive Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) services for children ages 2-8 with autism spectrum disorder, behavioral challenges, or other developmental needs. A ribbon-cutting recently celebrated the program's relocated from Rochester to 353 High Street in Somersworth. After acquiring the former Appledore Primary Care building and renovations were complete, the new clinic opened its doors in April.

"Year after year we aid an increasing number of families whose children have autism spectrum disorder or other di-

allows us to expand our program to provide these life enhancing services to more families, meeting a growing community need," said Chris Kozak, CEO of Community Partners.

Currently, Spectrum Connection serves about 20 children weekly who work with a Board-Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and a Registered Behavior Technician (RBT). Staff work intensively with the children on developing skills for daily living such as independence at mealtime, dressing, functional communication, cooperative play, and following routines. The families also learn techniques to support their child.

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

initiative, it doesn't need to be 50 pounds of this or a case of that. If you have a few deli containers that Gather can help turn into a sauce – fantastic – let them know and they'll come get it!"

Marino and her team of volunteers organize the pickup and create the recipes to repurpose the food into delicious and nutritious meals prepared at Gather's "Cooking 4 Commu-

nity" kitchens. The meals are then packaged for delivery to the food pantry. "Maintaining food safety through all the processes is a priority," said Marino.

Nina Parrott of Fifth Flavor Catering is a founding member of the coalition. She said, "Reducing food waste in my kitchen saves money and the planet, feeds hungry people, and forces me to be a more creative chef. It's easy

to cook with expensive, high-end ingredients, but I think some of my best dishes have come from challenging myself to use the seeds, roots, stalks, and leaves in interesting ways. I'm so excited to be a part of this coalition; not only to teach, but to learn from the other amazing seacoast chefs dedicated to the same cause."



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
